anyone responds, I'm not sure I understood what you're

saying, so I need you to basically repeat or paraphrase it. 2 I understand what the questioning was, and I understand you said he had a document, but is it -- you're saying that 3 4 it was someone with the same name and a different social 5 security number? 6 MS. ARCINIEGA: Different name and different 7 social security, and they're documents that Mr. Roy's 8 office produced to us. One, a W4 that his client Cinagro 9 had Ms. Antonio fill out that shows her full name and her 10 social security number and then the Silent Springs document 11 that shows a different name and a different social security number. And that was also -- that's also what he was 12 1.3 talking about and was also produced to our office, but they do not match. 14 15 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: Okav. 16 without reaching any sort of conclusion as to what the 17 questioning did or didn't involve and whether it would be appropriate or not, Mr. Roy, do you have a response? 18 19 MR. ROY: Your Honor --20 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: And you should 21 both take into account that I haven't seen the document so 2.2 I have no reason to know what the document is, which 23 doesn't necessarily mean that I would agree or disagree 24 with what was said but, Mr. Roy. 25

Your Honor, I had no intention of

harassing or intimidating the witness. That is overly 2 materialistic on the part of the Agency. I had a document provided to me by Silent Springs, along with the documents 3 4 for Marisol Jimenez, Hector Vasquez, Maria Duarte, and 5 Yolanda Antonio. I had no reason to believe these were 6 wrong in any way and in fact, as a result of the 7 questioning yesterday, it should -- it could be apparent 8 that someone else is using her social security number and 9 identity at a different place, if in fact she was working 10 at Deodar Farms at that period of time. 11 So I don't think there's any basis for the General Counsel's argument. 12 1.3 MS. ARCINIEGA: If I may be heard, Your Honor. ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: 14 15 MS. ARCINIEGA: The name on the Silent Springs document is similar, but it's not the same name and the 16 17 social security numbers are not the same numbers. And Mr. 18 Roy is in possession of documents that demonstrate this. 19 If Your Honor would like an informal review of the 20 documents, he produced them to us, and we can show Your 21 Honor. 2.2 MR. ROY: Your Honor, may I be heard? 23 The social security number for each of these 24 employees that -- who's documents were provided --25 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: I don't

want -- I don't want either of you to indicate what they are while we're on the record.

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MR. ROY: I understand that Your Honor, but there's no social security numbers on either of these documents. They've been crossed out by Silent Springs for the protection of the individuals, so I have no way of comparing social security numbers between what Ms. Arciniega's claiming and what was on the documents that I have.

MS. ARCINIEGA: If I may be heard when you're ready, Your Honor.

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: Okay.

MS. ARCINIEGA: The documents were provided to us by Mr. Roy unredacted and I have a copy of it in front of me that shows the social security number on it, and the name.

MR. ROY: It has been four years, Your Honor, since that investigation ensued and, you know, one of the arguments we've made in this case is the lack of due process because of the lateness of this investigation and hearing. I don't have any recollection at this point, in my file, of whether or not I gave those documents to her at that point. I did indicate to her, however, that these four employees were hired at Silent Springs. I don't have a specific recollection whether I gave them the same

documents that I have in my possession.

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: Okay, so let me just clarify something. Ms. Arciniega, do you know if the documents that you have with social security numbers were received by your office in the past year, or more further back than that?

MS. ARCINIEGA: Your Honor, to be honest, I would need to confer with Staff.

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: Okay, that's fine. You don't -- you don't know one way or another right now?

MS. ARCINIEGA: Not right now without conferring with Staff.

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: Okay. Right now I don't see any of this as creating any issues that causing us to need to further delay the hearing. I think all of the questioning, generally on it, was appropriate. It goes, very heavily, to the credibility of a witness who proceeded the current witness, who said that this person was there. But it goes to her credibility to recollect if in fact this witness was not there. So it's very relevant, I think, for Mr. Roy to inquire about that and I certainly intend to inquire about that further because it may substantially go to Ms. Jimenez's credibility if she said that Yolanda Antonio worked there when she didn't. I believe the Deodar documents also show the 20 social security number that matches the Cinagro document of 21 the W4. 2.2 So when Mr. Roy continues to talk to the witness 23 about this Silent Springs document and he represents to her

that it proves that she worked there, Your Honor, and we

all know now, and she knows, and she's testified to these

24

questions. Any further line of questioning relying on this Silent Springs document, which doesn't have the same name, I would like to ask Your Honor to consider the profundity of it. And that it would be harassing or intimidating to the witness.

administrative LAW Judge Soble: Okay. Well right now I don't think anything has been, what I would describe as harassing or intimidating. It's cross examination. He's trying to find out. If there's any confusion here, it seems like it was created by one of your other witnesses who suggested that she did work at the blueberry farm. And so -- I mean and whether -- what that means, and the significance of it, remains to be seen. But I'm not going to reach a conclusion yet, until I've asked some questions, for sure, whether or not her testimony is correct. But I can tell you, without reaching any overall conclusions, which would be inappropriate until I've heard all of the testimony.

I certainly understand why you might conclude that thus far, she seems more credible than the prior witnesses who said she did work at the blueberry farm, in terms of where she herself worked. I mean most people remember where they work.

So I'm going to allow him to ask further questions and I'm going to allow him to ask if she went by

that other name. If I was him, I'm not sure I would ask those questions because I don't see how they would help his case, frankly. I think it might help your case more, if you could prove in fact that she worked at the blueberry farm, than his. But that's based on only a little bit of information without hearing all of the testimony in the hearing. So I realize that different things can have different meanings by the time we're through with all of the testimony.

1.3

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So I do think, however, based upon what we've heard right now, that if he asks any further question making reference to the social security number, without any additional testimony, there would probably be inappropriate since it's pretty clear that if, for some reason, she did work at the blueberry farm she used a different social security number, then she had everywhere else. So the social security number isn't something that connects it to her. I mean one or the other would have to be inaccurate, whether it's a clerical error or whether it was given inappropriately.

So I'm not going to say which questions for sure can or can't be asked until I hear them, but I mean, I think at this point, I don't think the witness was intimidated. She had her position. Her position is she didn't work at the blueberry farm. Her position was that

she worked at, what it first sounded like either Atito or Theodore Farm and then she clarified was Deodar Farm. And we'll see if any of the attorneys on any -- on either side wish to try to impeach or rebut that testimony, or if they all agree that it's what sounds most likely right now.

So my guess is that none of the attorneys are going to spend a lot of time trying to persuade people, in the remainder of this hearing, that Ms. Antonio worked at the blueberry farm. And I think they're probably going to conclude that she did work at the vegetable farm. But that's speculation on my part and I'm not going to tell attorneys what to do and what's best for them on the fourth witness because there may be something I don't know about the case, factually. In fact not may, there most certainly is. I don't even know who the witnesses will be yet. So but I mean, I think I'll -- I don't even know if prior to this witness being called whether you expected her to say that she had worked at the blueberry farm or not.

But that being said, that's not what's before me right now. The question in terms of any of it being harassing or intimidating, I don't think so. We've avoided putting any of the social security numbers on the record, which I think is appropriate. And (indiscernible) change. And again, I think if Mr. Roy is going to ask more questions on that then he should ask if she ever went by

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the name Yolanda Cruz Antonio. And I think the answer most

   likely is going to be no, but I don't know that until it's

    asked. I mean again, a lot of these names are fairly

With the three or four previous questions, it certainly wasn't clear to me whether you were talking about with Art's Labor or with Cinagro and now the same is true and so I just -- I think I need you to specify which it is that you're talking about.

MR. ROY: Yeah.

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: I think I know the answer, but.

MR. ROY: I asked in reference to Cinagro, Your Honor. And those statements that were given, along with the check, and now I'm trying to --

ask that again because I certainly didn't take your question and the witness's answer to be clear whether or not the statements that you were asking about were at Art's Labor or at Cinagro. I may have not heard you indicate that but rather than having the court reporter read it back.

- 17 MS. ARCINIEGA: Objection, Your Honor. Vague as 18 to time.
- 19 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: When there's an 20 objection, the witness needs to wait until I rule on the 21 objection before answering.
- 2.2 MS. ARCINIEGA: Your Honor, I don't think the 23 translator like indicated to her there was an objection.
- 24 THE INTERPRETER: I didn't have a chance Counsel, 25

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SOBLE: Okay. That's fine. Sometimes the witnesses notice that on their own because they understand objection, but it is ideal to have the interpreter say that. When we're here in person it's a lot easier because a lot of the time they'll just sort of raise their hand to gesture to wait too, and that's much harder to do in this format, so.

In any event, the objection is overruled, but I do think that it's a little bit vague as to what time is being talked about so Counsel may want to flush that out with follow-up questions, but I'll overrule the objection.

MR. ROY: Your Honor, I don't think there's any confusion as to what month it was because I asked him initially between the time of his last employment for the seven to ten days thereafter and he agreed that he did go to work at Deodar within seven to ten days after working for Cinagro.

I was just trying to peg the date. If he doesn't remember the date, then that's fine. But we were inferring backwards.
